#### Child Abuse Prevention and Identification Interdisciplinary Education Projects

In our ongoing efforts to enhance interdisciplinary education, Zero Abuse would like to highlight recent initiatives by the **National Child Welfare Workforce Institute (NCWWI)**. NCWWI's Child Abuse Prevention and Identification Interdisciplinary Education Projects support undergraduate and graduate programs aiming to train professionals in preventing, identifying, and responding to child abuse. Two CAST organizations were represented in this project.

Specifically, the **University of South Dakota** and the **Children's Advocacy Centers of Mississippi** harnessed the power of CAST education to improve hiring and retention of a diverse workforce with knowledge and skills in understanding families and best practices surrounding the reduction and response to child abuse and neglect. Their efforts underscore the importance of interdisciplinary collaboration in child welfare education and the demand for CAST education for child-serving professionals. #### **CAST Faculty Training at Shepherd University**

As CAST programming expands nationally, faculty training becomes crucial for enhancing the quality of education that future child-serving professionals receive. Recognizing this, **Dr. Craig Cline** from **Shepherd University** initiated specialized training through Zero Abuse to optimize CAST instruction. In March 2024, Zero Abuse facilitated a half-day comprehensive virtual training for select faculty on the core undergraduate CAST courses. The training emphasized best practices in CAST instruction, project-based and experiential learning facilitation, mindfulness in education, and trauma-aware teaching. # More Evidence of CAST Importance in New Publication: "Unto the Third Generation" Article Revisited

Chief Program Officer of Education and Research Victor Vieth and CAST Director Tyler Counsil, along with other Zero Abuse staff and expert colleagues, were recently published in the Journal of Child Sexual Abuse. This article, titled "Unto the Third Generation" Revisited: the Impact of a National Plan to End Child Abuse in the United States within Three Generations, emphasizes cultural sensitivity and diversity. It specifically addresses racial disproportionality and disparity, including issues such as racial disparities, LGBTQIA2S+ victims, male victims, and the impact of technology in response to child maltreatment.
